Physical Education

First grade students in Ms. Hazelip's class (Room 102), continue working on their throwing and spatial awareness skills by engaging in physical activities that require throwing for accuracy. In this week's photos, students took part in the activity titled "Clean Your Room," where students throw yarn balls to the opposing team's side. The yarn balls represent "garbage," and the team with the most yarn balls on their side at the end of the round have the messiest room. Both teams then engage in a quick workout activity, such as jumping jacks, toe-touches, and holding themselves up in the push up position for five seconds. Students are having a blast, demonstrating their understanding of personal space, play area boundaries, and completing the task at hand, while playing by the rules (SHAPE Standards 1-5).

I learned that Aaron Douglas was an important artist in the Harlem Renaissance. I also learned that jazz emerged during it, and that Black people were finally able to get better education and better work in the north.

I chose to make my art about bullying because it is a big problem in many schools and workplaces. I made the setting to be a school because for me it represents the place that it happens most in. The line through the middle separates the two scenes. On the wall on the left is a poster that encourages people to be mean and on the right wall is another poster that encourages kindness. The figures on the left are one person bullying the other, and on the left is two people who are accepting their differences and talking it out. I chose blue because it is both sad and also happy in a weird way.

What I learned about the Harlem Renaissance was it was a time lots of music and paintings. The Harlem Renaissance took place between slavery and the Civil Rights Movement so many African Americans moved to a place that

I learned that after slavery ended, there still was discrimination towards people with darker skin colors. A lot of black people went to the north to escape this discrimination. I learned that Aaron Dougas was black and was living during the Harlem Renaissance. He made paintings using a monochromatic color scheme, silhouettes, symbols, and he made the background the lightest color and in the front the darkest to add depth. His paintings show slavery, and people migrating to the north. His paintings show what is important to him.

I chose to make my work about feminism, and how men are given more opportunities and things handed to them than women. I chose this because I see this happen all the time, and I am a girl and believe that men get more opportunities. I chose pink because pink is said to be a "girl" color and it represents girls. The symbol I chose was the female symbol, I also had a gear in the front to show she is working. The girl on the right is working to build her ladder, she is holding a hammer and has supplies. On the left the guys had a ladder built for him so he can succeed. That represents that he has opportunities given to him. The girl's ladder is smaller and has many gaps so that she can't climb it. The guy has a big and strong ladder that has very little gaps so it is easy to climb.
