In recent newsletters, I've written about the history of grading policy and practices at Prescott as well introducing one of several updates to the proposed grading policy and practices. Today, I'll continue to share the proposed changes. Thanks to the many teachers who have initiated the work, including Haley Birnbaum, Tayler Showalter, Nessy Moos, Kelly Abolt, Jennifer Phares, and to many others for their input. In June, I met with the *Student Voice Committee* to get helpful feedback from many students. At the July LSC meeting, parent and community representatives also shared helpful insights. Much of the school's grading policy and practices are founded on *Grading for Equity* by Joe Feldman. The below has been abbreviated for space considerations.

Purpose of Prescott School's grading policy

Prescott's grading policy is grounded in **accuracy**, **bias resistance**, and **self-determination**, so students are empowered to achieve high, holistic growth. The school expects each students' grades to represent their mastery of concepts and content. Teachers, parents, and staff engage with students to facilitate their holistic growth across disciplines, including the arts and physical education, as well as social-emotional learning (SEL). Ultimately, students are responsible for their learning.

Expected outcomes of the grading policy change

Our new grading policy will accurately reflect student mastery of content, concepts, and skills. As it focuses tightly on student learning mastery, it will protect students from subjective bias. It will also empower students to be in charge of demonstrating their learning achievements.

Several new or improved grading practices will likely lead to increased learning and therefore higher grades. The new grading scale raises expectations, so teachers and students have to work together to get more (the goal is all!) students to the levels of A and B learning mastery.

Teachers' increased focus on clear and descriptive rubrics will help students to know exactly what they have to do to show learning mastery.

The additional time and opportunities for students to show learning mastery will be flexible for student schedules. There will not be infinite time but there will be more flexibility.

The elimination of homework as part of the grade will allow students to focus on their areas of growth and to take chances. We want them to explore during homework by trying new math solution paths and writing dialog, for example. If they get a grade for homework, they will not experiment. Experimentation allows them to learn just like a scientist. Students will still have homework as a way to practice. Teachers will teach them to decide what homework will best help them to master the learning.

These improved grading practices arise from the grading policy change. They align well with our *Student-Led Conferences* shift that we initiated last year, because they empower students to analyze their learning and determine their learning goals after each report card.

I look forward to evaluating this new policy with teacher leaders and reporting back to you in the Spring!

8th grade offering of Chicago Test Prep at Prescott School Course start date is Tuesday, August 30. Deadline to register is Sunday, August 29.

This course is designed to prepare students for the high school entrance exams requires for Selective Enrollment, Parochial and Independent High Schools. The course reviews the math, reading, language and vocabulary content on the HS Entrance Exams as well as test taking strategies. Students will complete homework assignments between sessions to reinforce the in-class topics that are covered.

The course goals are to prepare students for the high school entrance exam content as well as provide students with test taking strategies. Additionally, a goal of the course is to help students feel more confident and less nervous when testing. The end goal is for students to score well on the high school entrance exams so they have multiple high school options.

Physical Education

Welcome back Prescott Students, Parent/Guardians, and Stakeholders! I am excited to be working with the Prescott Community once again this school year.

Students will be working on collaborative activities to develop their teamwork, problem solving, and communication skills to be successful, as well as performance skills

throughout the school year.

In Week 1 of the 2023 School Year, 8th grade students from Room 203 (Ms. Page) and 6th grade Room 304 (Mrs. Edwards) began PE class with a collaborative activity challenge. Students were tasked to retrieve equipment from the floor by closing their eyes and using non-verbal communication. The last person in line of each group was the only person that was allowed to have their eyes open to guide their team to retrieve the items. Groups were allowed time before engaging in the activity to develop a non verbal communication system for the challenge.

Students were also reminded that fair play (not opening eyes) and practicing the honor system during the activity.
